




The \$5.5 million in competitive and strategic grants, shown above, is only a portion of the total \$10.9 million in qualified distributions and grants made by the Foundation since our founding in 1987. This \$10.9 million includes distributions from the 80 or so funds established at ECF by other organizations and by individual donors.

The larger figure also includes Foundation programs like Leadership Evanston, Communityworks, and our operating costs.

The idea behind our new Two Generation initiative is simple: to nurture the child, it makes sense to nurture the parent as well. That's why this spring we offered a career exploration program, including financial planning, to low-income parents of children enrolled in early childhood education programs. Both generations are learning together.

The program, developed in collaboration with Northwestern researchers, aims to make education a family affair. Judging from all the proud smiles and happy tears at our first graduation ceremony, we're on the right track. Now we're working to address the barriers to further success.

return on investment

A Foundation grant changed the fate of the Special Needs Transition House at Evanston Township High School. Ten thousand dollars allowed the program—which serves students with moderate to severe disabilitiesto fund more job coaching and training. As a result, more graduates found work.

These jobs are about more than money: they're also a source of pride for young Evanstonians who might otherwise have left high school without prospects.

Having proven its ability to leverage new resources, the Transition House was able to secure increased state funding. Before our grant, the amount the program received was \$11,000 each year. Now it receives \$44,000.
