



A solid tax refund is like an extra paycheck: money in the bank. That's why, for the last three years, we've helped the Center for Economic Progress give free tax prep advice to low-income Evanstonians.

Last year, the organization helped 491 local households file taxes, generating \$797,242 in refunds and saving at least \$85,000 in prep fees. For each dollar CEP receives. it saves 34 for its clients. That's money that families can spend on essentials like healthy food, education, and savings.

the Foundation changed everything

In 2010, Mudlark Theater was a tiny non-profit with ambitious goals: to take children seriously as artists, empower them as creative decision-makers, and produce vibrant shows that erased the distinction between youth and professional theater. But their small size meant they could work with only about 100 kids each year.

Going through our root2fruit capacity-building program from 2010-2012 changed everything. Since then, their annual revenue has tripled, reaching \$240,000. They put on more plays, go into more schools, and run more summer camps than ever before.

Now, instead of 100 kids each year, they work with over 1,500.

This summer, four Evanston young adults without stable housing got to move into a house of their own.

Their journey began at the Foundation and relied on close collaboration among our partners. As a result of her participation in our Leadership Evanston program, Sheryl Bartol teamed up with Curt's Café and Connections for the Homeless to brainstorm a solution to a pressing need: housing solutions for young adults who needed support beyond just a roof over their heads. Together they secured a two-flat and raised funds to pay a full-time, live-in support staff. They call the program Our House, a name that recognizes homelessness as a problem best approached by a whole community working together.
