## How ECF is Meeting the Moment

### INVESTING IN EVANSTON

- Launched Resilience Grants to help nonprofits weather sudden federal and state funding losses.
- Shifted all Community-Led Grants to unrestricted support, reflecting our trust in local organizations to decide what their communities need most — and giving them the flexibility to adapt, grow, and lead.

### EMPOWERING LEADERS

- Expanded our Leadership Circles to support Black, Latine, and executive nonprofit leaders.
- Launched Board Leadership Training via the Ubuntu Leadership Institute Initiative.

### ADVANCING JUSTICE

- Prioritized funding to BIPOC-led organizations and those focused on racial equity.
- Deepened Community-Led grantmaking to ensure those most affected by injustice guide funding decisions.
- Continued long-term support of reparative initiatives that address systemic harm.

## RESPONSIVE GRANTMAKING:

### A Rapid Response to Community Crisis

In 2025, Evanston nonprofits faced a dual crisis. On one hand, organizations saw sudden and significant funding cuts from federal, state, and local sources. On the other, many were serving communities under increasing threat — including our undocumented neighbors facing fear, misinformation, and uncertainty about their safety and future.

In response, ECF launched Resilience Grants to provide flexible, rapid-response funding that allowed nonprofits not just to survive, but to adapt in a time of uncertainty. Some organizations used these dollars to sustain core services like housing support, legal aid, and mental health care. Others pivoted quickly to offer “Know Your Rights” workshops and emergency resources for families navigating possible deportation.

These grants empowered local leaders to respond to the moment — to protect their communities, offer stability, and ensure no one was left behind.

In total, we distributed **\$300,000** in Resilience Grants this year — all part of our broader effort to meet the moment. ECF is on track to distribute an anticipated **\$3.4 million** in grantmaking across Evanston in 2025, thanks to the generous support of donors like you.

# Resilience Grants

Launched in 2025, Resilience Grants help nonprofits navigate sudden financial hardships like federal, state, or local budget cuts. They sustain essential services such as counseling, housing, legal aid, and emergency support, keeping critical programs running during times of uncertainty.

# WHAT I LEARNED FROM LEADERSHIP EVANSTON

In my three years at the Evanston Community Foundation, I've watched colleagues go through our Leadership Evanston program and come out inspired and energized. This year, it was finally my turn, and from day one, I knew I was part of something special.

Each Leadership Evanston cohort is carefully curated to reflect the heart of our city. Our 33rd cohort included nonprofit leaders, police officers, Rotarians, small business owners, faith leaders, and community volunteers — a group as diverse and dynamic as Evanston itself.

Over ten months, we met twice a month, gradually building trust, connection, and a shared sense of purpose. What struck me most was the network we built. Leadership isn't just about vision, it's about relationships. It's about knowing who to call when a challenge arises and being willing to show up when others call on you. I saw firsthand how alumni of this program continue to support one another long after graduation, collaborating to solve real issues in our community. Our cohort was no different.

As the year progressed, a new kind of urgency entered the room. Every session, someone shared hard news: a grant cut, a program at risk, a federal department on the chopping block. We listened to the CFOs of Districts 65 and 202 talk about the fragility of education funding. We heard about potential research losses at Northwestern. It became clear that no organization or institution was being spared.

Still, every project group showed up on presentation day with ideas to make Evanston better. That's what stuck with me the most. Even in the face of enormous uncertainty, people in our cohort kept going. They kept dreaming, kept building, kept caring for one another and for this city.

Leadership Evanston reminded me how proud I am to work for ECF, a foundation that doesn't just fund solutions, but brings people together to create them. In a year when so much has felt out of our control, this experience grounded me in something deeper: the power of connection, and the belief that we can face anything if we do it together.



# INFANT WELFARE SOCIETY OF EVANSTON (IWSE):

## Keeping Families Afloat: How Resilience and Flexibility Make a Difference

In the heart of Evanston, the Infant Welfare Society (IWSE) stands as a beacon of hope for families facing extraordinary challenges. With a mission that goes far beyond traditional childcare, IWSE provides comprehensive support to the community's most vulnerable families, particularly those in the lowest economic tiers.

### Stepping Up Amidst Funding Uncertainty

2025 brought unprecedented challenges for IWSE. Federal funding threats to an already resource-strained early childhood sector created a perfect storm of financial insecurity. "Sometimes we're operating for months without critical funding," said Stephen Vick, IWSE Executive Director.

The Evanston Community Foundation's Resilience Grant became the bridge needed to ensure IWSE could maintain critical services without interruption. This support meant keeping dedicated staff employed and continuing vital programs that support families at their most vulnerable moments.

### One powerful example illustrates the grant's impact:

When IWSE discovered that a young mother enrolled in one of its programs was sleeping on a train with her two young children, they were able to immediately mobilize resources. By leveraging partnerships and emergency funds, they quickly secured hotel housing and eventually a new apartment for the family.



Beyond the Resilience Grant, IWSE received a Community-Led Grant that provided crucial unrestricted support. This flexible funding allowed the organization to address needs that aren't typically covered by traditional grants.

“Unrestricted funds allow us to do everything from maintaining our facilities to providing extended mental health services,” Steve explains. Whether it's replacing an air conditioner or supporting a family through an extended crisis, these funds provide the critical flexibility nonprofits need to truly serve their communities.

### **More Than Childcare: A Holistic Approach**

IWSE's work goes far beyond babysitting childcare. They serve families through Early Head Start, supporting children from the lowest-income backgrounds. Their comprehensive approach includes nutrition education, mental health resources, and support for entire family units.

“We're preparing children for kindergarten and beyond,” Diana Newton, IWSE's Director of Development, emphasizes. “If we don't support brain development and family stability in these critical early years, we're setting up challenges for future education.”

By supporting the Evanston Community Foundation, donors aren't just giving money—they're providing lifelines to families, supporting innovative programs, and helping build a stronger, more resilient community.

As Steve puts it, “The foundation's support means we can keep fighting for our families, even when everything else seems uncertain.”
