Tonight, we're excited to present the recipients of just over \$800,000 in competitive and strategic grants ECF is distributing in 2016. We are lucky to have such strong partners to work jointly toward our mission of helping Evanston thrive as a just, vibrant, and inclusive community.

This evening, we are announcing a record of nearly \$312,000 in responsive grants to 29 organizations, chosen from a very strong pool of 64 proposals. These grants are made possible in large part due to our generous grantmaking partners. We could not say yes as widely and deeply to organizations without Northwestern University Dance Marathon (NUDM) and the 20 other grantmaking partners whose commitment and thoughtfulness greatly increases the pool of grant dollars available to Evanston nonprofits.

- *root2fruit*, a partnership with the Mammel Foundation, building organizational capacity
- Communityworks, supported by ECF's Communityworks Fund, working to ensure that every child is ready for kindergarten and every youth is ready for work
- Partners for the Future, funded by an anonymous donor, helping organizations grow major gifts
- Fundraising Service Grants, funded by an anonymous donor, mentoring organizations to build a robust development program

Funded by the Communityworks Endowment Fund established in 2003, our Communityworks initiative provides programmatic and grantmaking support toward the goal of ensuring every child is ready for kindergarten and every youth is ready for work. This year, we will be investing nearly \$230,000 in grants and programs to sustain a network focused on home visiting, family support, and excellent early childhood education.
